1. DECLARATION OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST

2. PUBLIC AND ADMINISTRATIVE PRESENTATIONS

2.1 Bathurst Regional Airport by Alain Guitard

The president of the Northern New Brunswick Airport Authority (NNBAA) provided an update on the Bathurst Regional Airport's challenges and future plans. The airport has faced significant struggles over the past five years, starting with the grounding of the Boeing 737 Max in 2019 due to safety concerns, which led to reduced flights. Following the two-year pandemic, a pilot shortage further complicated operation. During the most recent meeting with Air Canada, the airport asked when daily flights would resume, but the response indicated that, given the current challenges, daily flights are not expected in the medium to short term.

The airport is now working to develop a sustainable model to support four flights per week, but this remains difficult with the current staffing levels. It's crucial to maintain staffing for air

ambulance services, which adds a significant cost, especially considering the ongoing expenses required to maintain the runway for these operations.

To address these challenges, the airport secured funding from ACCOA and has scheduled a consultant to assess the airport's operations from March 17 to 19. The consultant's goal is to help create a viable operational model that could support more commercial flights. Currently, the airport is operating at a deficit of approximately \$50,000 per month. However, they have also secured a gap loan from RBC for up to \$300,000, which will help sustain operations until June. The consultant's review is part of their efforts to stabilize and improve the airport's financial situation.

The primary concern is to avoid losing the airport's certification, as it is issued by Transport Canada, which is very strict with its requirements. Currently, there are grandfather clauses in place, but if the airport loses its certification and applies for it again in the future, it will need to be reclassified. The grandfather clauses will no longer apply, and the airport will have to meet the new regulations. While some of these new requirements may be straightforward, others, such as those related to zoning, could be more complex to navigate.

2.2 Chaleur Regional Service Commission - Community Development by Jennifer Pitre

The Chaleur Regional Service Commission's (CRSC) Director of Community Development gave an update on the community development initiatives in the Chaleur Region. The presentation demonstrated the services being provided in the community.
