

SNOW & ICE CONTROL



he City of Bathurst's Snow and Ice Control Program strives to maintain the safety of its transportation network, including vehicle access and active transportation such as walking or cycling, allowing users to function as normally as possible under adverse weather conditions.

Snow removal operations include the following elements:



- ☑ roadway clearing and widening;
- ✓ sidewalk clearing:
- clearing corners for better visibility:
- ☑ clearing fire hydrants;
- moving snow to snow dumps.

Tracking progress on the emergency snow routes

The City has two designated emergency routes, with the mandate to keep them, if possible, bare-surface and full-width at all times.

In our continued efforts to better inform our citizens, we recently launched an online snow plow tracker that allows you to track the progress on these emergency snow routes during a storm.





The work, of course, doesn't stop there. Cleanup of all streets and sidewalks begins once a storm has ended, or reached an accumulation trigger — about 3 inches (8 centimeters). Snow removal crews will usually work from midnight to the early morning, pushing back snow banks and loading snow into dump trucks for transport to City snow dumping locations.

At the heart of this colossal endeavour is our **dedicated Public Works team**. This group of hard-working individuals is the backbone of our success; with our skilled operators keeping our roads safe, and our heavy equipment mechanics keeping our fleet in top shape while faced with harsh — and often unforgiving — winter conditions.



SUMMER CONSTRUCTION ST. ANNE & CHALEUR



Two major infrastructure projects are scheduled to begin this summer, both impacting major roadways within the city: **St. Anne Street** and **Chaleur Street**. These two important projects represent an estimated investment of **\$5.3M** in our municipality.

Each street, for a period of approximately 24 weeks likely starting in May 2024, will be innaccessible during this project. This will allow the crews to complete a **full reconstruction**, including above-ground and below-ground infrastructure.

Local residents can expect temporary restrictions on accessing their property with their vehicle during certain periods. Advance notice will be provided for these situations, and we will make every effort to address any inconveniences.

2024 BUDGET

(AN OVERVIEW)

Bathurst City Council has approved a balanced 2024 budget totaling \$49,976,122.

The General Operating and Capital Fund budget make up \$39.1M of this total. This budget, funded by property taxes, covers all city services and projects except for water and sewer, which is entirely separate. Think of Water & Sewer as a separate company, funded by user fees through their utility bills. The total Water and Sewer Utility budget in 2024 is \$10.9M.


Property Tax rates in the City's old boundaries (Ward 1) are maintained at \$1.7750 per \$100 of property assessment. The new boundaries (Ward 2) are seeing transitional increases directly related to the Local Governance Reform process. North Tetaqouche residents will see an increase to \$0.8652, while South Tetagouche, Ste Anne, Big River and Route 134 (beyond Miramichi Avenue) will see an increase to \$0.8420.

MUNICIPAL SERVICES

WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM

The municipal services City residents receive each day are funded through the following sources:

- Property taxes (\$26.3M)
- Non-tax revenues such as fees, licenses, sales of services, etc. (\$4.2M)
- Equalization grant (\$3.5M)



WHERE THE MONEY GOES

Municipal services encompass a broad range of essential amenities and facilities provided to residents of Bathurst, ensuring the well-being, safety, and functionality of our municipality.

Services are divided in eight major categories: General Government Services, Protective Services, Transportation Services, Environmental Health Services, Environmental Development Services, Recreational and Cultural Services, Fiscal Services, and Other Services.

** "Infrastructure only" means the service is available but not connected,

Note: If an owner previously paid ONLY for water services (or ONLY sewer services), they will only pay for that portion.

Applicable discounts

NEW: All owners who provide proof of annual household income of less than \$40,000 can benefit from a **yearly discount of 10%**.

OR

Owners age 65+ who provide proof of receiving (or eligibility to receive) an allowance under the Guaranteed Income Supplement are entitled to a **discount of \$221.80**.

Added savings with early yearly payment

If clients choose to make a single annual payment, they can obtain a **5% Yearly discount** if the account is paid in full before February 28th.

WATER & SEWER (LET'S TALK ABOUT UNITS!)

The concept of units may seem confusing at first, so let's try to clarify the picture!

Begin by asking this question: "Is there is only one water service line coming into the building, or more than one?" For every service line, there is an account. This determines what rate is applicable.

Here are some examples:




A single-family dwelling — usually with one water service line — is a single unit.


Without adding the available discounts, the owner receives a monthly bill of \$68.75 for their combined Water and Sewer services.

On the other hand, a dwelling with a single service line, where the owner rents out a portion — such as a basement apartment — is considered **as two units**.

This translates into one account (one bill) with TWO UNITS, and a monthly fee of \$54.75 each, for a total of \$109.50.

Multi-unit apartment buildings are also calculated like this; refer to the table on the previous page for those rates.





In our final example, we have a duplex; a two-family dwelling with **two separate units** in the same building — each unit having its own water service line.

This means two accounts of one unit each, with each owner receiving separate monthly bills for \$68.75.

The same logic applies to condominiums; each condo is considered as an individual unit.

POLICING IN REVIEW: A SNAPSHOT OF 2023

As we embark upon a new year, it's essential to reflect on the collective efforts and accomplishments of our dedicated law enforcement personnel throughout 2023.

Their unwavering commitment to safeguarding our community has been paramount, evidenced by the following statistics:

<u>Total Calls for Service</u>: Our officers responded to a total of 9,451 calls for service, demonstrating their readiness to address a wide range of issues and emergencies faced by our residents.

<u>Traffic Citations Issued</u>: With a keen focus on ensuring road safety, our officers issued 1,797 traffic citations, reinforcing our commitment to promoting responsible driving habits within our municipality.

<u>DUI Arrests/Suspensions/Demands</u>: The enforcement of driving under the influence laws remained a top priority, resulting in **52 arrests, suspensions, or demands**, underscoring our zero-tolerance stance towards impaired driving.

<u>Domestic Violence Incidents Reported</u>: Our department handled 125 reported incidents of domestic violence, emphasizing our dedication to supporting victims and holding perpetrators accountable for their actions

<u>Property Crimes Reported</u>: Despite the challenges posed by property crimes, our proactive measures led to the <u>reporting and investigation of 583 cases</u>, illustrating our relentless pursuit of justice for victims and the protection of their property.

<u>Crimes Against a Person</u>: Addressing crimes against individuals with utmost urgency, our officers responded to and investigated **242 incidents**, reaffirming our commitment to ensuring the safety and well-being of every member of our community.

<u>Suspended Drivers</u>: Taking decisive action against reckless driving behaviors, our department encountered 93 cases of suspended drivers, further highlighting our efforts to maintain order on our roads and uphold traffic regulations.

What to do in the event of a cooking fire

Ensure you always have a lid within reach when cooking. In the event of a small grease fire igniting in a pan, promptly smother the flames by sliding the lid over the pan. Turn off the burner immediately and avoid moving the pan. To prevent the fire from reigniting, keep the lid on until the pan has cooled down. Under no circumstances should you pour water onto a grease fire in a cooking pan.

Overall, our year-to-date total service calls — as of December 2023 — are at **481**





Emergency vehicles: a friendly reminder

When an authorized emergency vehicle approaches from either direction with audible signals such as a bell or siren and visual signals like flashing red lights, all drivers must **promptly pull over** to the right-hand curb and come to a complete stop. They must remain stopped until the emergency vehicle has passed, unless instructed otherwise by a peace officer.
